Transplant and your mental health

We all are aware that our physical health impacts our mental health (and vice versa). When you live with a chronic health condition, it is common to experience changes in your mood, activity, and day-to-day emotions. Transplant candidates and recipients are at an increased risk for mental health concerns, both pretransplant and post-transplant. This can be due to a variety of factors including a preexisting mental health condition, a new diagnosis, and medication side effects.

The most common issues experienced are mood and anxiety-related disorders. Common symptoms include mood swings, lack of motivation, avoidance of medical appointments/testing, noncompliance, poor sleep, and even thoughts of self-harm. It is vital that you are attentive to your mental health and ask for help when needed. The earlier you can address the issues that arise, the better it will be for you.

If you need assistance in locating a mental health provider or are in crisis, please reach out to someone such as your transplant social worker, dialysis social worker, primary care provider, insurance company, and/or family/friends. The 988 Suicide & Crisis Lifeline is another resource—either call 988 or go online.

Winter weather is upon us

Winter weather is upon us, leading to increased usage of heat in our homes. This can lead to increased stress both mentally and on your finances. Assistance is available through the Low-Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP).

LIHEAP provides cash grants to low-income households to help pay heating bills, with crisis grants available for those in immediate danger of being without heat. The grant is a one-time payment that is sent to the utility company and is credited towards your bill. The grant amount depends on household size, household income, and the type of fuel. Because this is a grant, it does not have to be repaid!

You can apply between November 1 to April 1 each year. These applications are first-come, first-served. Reach out to your dialysis social worker or one of the social workers here at UI Health Care Organ Transplant Center for information on where to apply.

Rose Bowl Parade

Every New Year's Day, there is a Donate Life Rose Bowl parade float that is a memorial to organ, eye, and tissue donors. The first float was in 2004. Donors are represented or memorialized on the float in florographs. Iowa Donor Network honors a deceased donor on the float with a floragraph each year, as do other OPOs for their respective states. Recipients are also honored–sometimes riding on the float. The float's riders, walkers, and honorees represent millions of people who have been impacted by donation. The 135 Rose Parade will occur at 10 a.m. CST on January 1, 2024.

Medicare Post-Transplant

Medicare coverage applies to those that receive a transplant at a Medicare approved facility. This is important for any potential present and future immunosuppressant coverage. Medicare Part B will cover immunosuppressants at 80% after the deductible is met, with 20% being the patient's responsibility or covered by a secondary payor. Medicare Advantage plans apply the same rules.
